Dear Friends,

Our small gardens here, front and back, are blessed by red, pink and white hydrangea, including a climbing one! We have many other plants, small and larger, but these plants when they are getting into full bloom, right now, they remind me so much of my visits with my Mum to see my Grandad up in Longview, Huyton. My Dad was fond of them too, though there was little chance in our house in Langton Road. But I have made up that love of both of them here in Dublin.

I don't know about you but these nights, after hot days, can grumble with the sound of thunder. Rain pours off the roof in a deluge and then the sun comes out again. I know that Jesus, his family and his followers must have been well used to such sun at least. But we are now only just beginning to experience such sun. The earth is so dry. Remember the torment of Jesus in the desert. Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. After fasting for forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. The tempter came to him and said, 'If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread.
