#### Dear Friends,

I pray you all survived the blistering hot weather recently! It wasn't quite as hot on this side of the Irish Sea, but hot enough for me. According to the old *Gaelic* calendar, Autumn begins on 1 August and goes through to end October. Basically, it refers to harvest time and, before all this very hot/dry weather due to 'Global Warming' started to change everything, it wasn't usually that far off. When the kids were small, we used to rent a cottage in Carlow and that was a place when the tractors were working huge hours to get the cereals in for porridge and, of course, the beer. When we lived in Bolton, we got an extra week in early Autumn, when the mills were closed, and that was a great opportunity, when over in Ireland, because local kids had gone back to school in early September.

If you look up **Ecclesiastes 3 1-5 & 9-14**, you will find how important God's gift to us for the seasons is a time for everything.
